In October 2019, the Department for Education Select Committee published a report following an 18-month inquiry into Government reforms of the Special Educational Needs and Disability System. The report highlighted serious issues with the implementation of the reforms outlined in the Children and Families Act 2014. With SEND pupils representing 14.9% of the pupil population, and 3.1% having Education, Health and Care plans, this has created additional pressure for local governments, schools, and families.

This event will analyse the developments over the last year and look ahead to the possible future improvements. You will learn new strategies being utilised in delivering Special Education Needs. Speakers will cover a range of topics, from the changes in implementing the local area SEND inspection framework to improving local authority services for SEND pupils.



### **Speaker Biographies**

#### John Galloway

Expert Advisor, LGfL

John Galloway is a specialist in the use of technology to support the inclusion of children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) in the curriculum. His work covers all phases of schools and learners with a very broad range of SEND. Along with providing advice and assessment for both groups and individuals, he also runs projects in schools to support greater inclusion through technology. John works part-time for Tower Hamlets, as well as consulting and writing more widely. He has spoken at conferences across the UK, including BETT, the Education Show, and TES SEN, and internationally in Chicago, Copenhagen, and New Delhi.

He has written many articles for national publications, such as TES and The Guardian, and specialist ones such as Special Children and Special World, as well as contributing to a diverse range of blogs. He has published several books, most recently co-authoring 'Learning with Mobile and Handheld Technologies' – winner of Best Book in the 2015 Technology and Innovation Awards.

#### Glinys Weller

Advisory Group, Nasen

Glinys has substantial experience in the development of educational strategy and Children's Services and is a specialist in school improvement. She has 30 years' experience of working in education including two headships and senior roles in different local authorities. Since September 2003, Glinys has worked as a consultant and interim manager. Her assignments have included work in a number of local authorities, as well as the implementation of national education strategy for the Department for Education.

Glinys has been at the forefront of developing Special Educational Needs policy and practice since entering the teaching profession in the 1970s. She has a strong interest in developing provision to support mental health and in finding creative approaches to meeting a wide range of social and emotional needs through early intervention and the use of evidence-based teaching. Recent assignments have included Interim Headteacher of the Virtual School in the London Borough of Barnet, where she subsequently led a review of Alternative Provision, whilst acting as consultant headteacher to an SEMH special school, and then Quality and Partnership Lead for SEN in the London Borough of Ealing to help prepare for the area inspection. She is currently Interim Headteacher of Surrey Virtual School.

#### Dr Joseph Mintz

Associate Professor in Education, UCL Institute of Education

Dr Joseph Mintz is Associate Professor in Education at UCL Institute of Education. The main thrust of his work is focused on autism education, teacher education for inclusion and the use of educational technology for inclusion. He has recently completed an evaluation of ITE and NQT education for inclusion in Ireland, and is currently exploring how big data approaches might be applied to the effective inclusion of children with SEN.





#### Rebecca Liddiard

#### Head of Specialist Services for Children and Young People, Sense

Rebecca Liddiard is the Head of Sense Specialist Services for Children and Young People. Rebecca is a Qualified Teacher of the Multi-Sensory Impaired (QTMSI) and the Visually Impaired (QTVI). She has worked in special education for 17 years both within specialist education settings as a teacher and also in an advisory role.

Sense is a national charity, here to help everyone who is deafblind or living with other complex disabilities to communicate and experience the world. We believe that no one, no matter how complex their disabilities, should be isolated, left out, or unable to fulfil their potential. Sense provides the individual, tailored support children, young people and adults need to lead a fulfilling life, as well as supporting families as a whole and campaigning for the rights of people with complex disabilities to take part in life. The Sense Specialist Services for Children and Young People team consists of MSI Consultant Teachers and MSI Practitioners, providing information, advice and support to children, young people and their families. The service provides direct support, activities, groups, information and advice for children and young people aged 0 - 25 who are deafblind and those with progressive conditions which may result in dual sensory impairment. They also provide advice and activities for young people with a single sensory (vision or hearing) impairment and additional needs.

#### **Kerry Taylor**

#### Service Lead, Rotherham SENDIASS

Kerry Taylor is the Service Lead for Rotherham SEND Information, Advice and Support Service (SENDIASS). The Service changed its name from Parent Partnership, and increased its remit following the SEND Reforms in 2014. As such, she has worked within the service providing advice and support for Rotherham families for the past 16 years.

Before working for Parent Partnership Service/ SENDIASS, she worked in both special and mainstream schools providing support to children who had various additional needs and disabilities. Working with children with additional needs was so very rewarding in many ways and Kerry has nothing but fond memories of the children and families that she supported during those years. She has a family of her own who keep her very busy outside of her working life as both her children swim competitively, and one also plays football for a local team which they also support as parents. Kerry is also the proud owner of a very crazy, mixed up rescue dog called Jess, who keeps the family on their toes.

#### Stephen Dedridge

#### Head of Autism Accreditation (South), National Autistic Society

Stephen is joint head of the Autism Accrediation Quality Assurance Programme offered by the National Autistic Society. Over 500 schools and services both in the UK as well as Europe, the Middle East and Asia have participated in the programme so that the quality of support they provide to autistic adults and children can be evaluated. Stephen started his career as a mainstream teacher, becoming the SENCO of a mainstream comprehensive high school in Herfordshire before making the decision to specialise in the field of autism. This led to him becoming an educational consultant on autism for the London Borough of Ealing SENS team.

In August 2007, Stephen joined the National Autistic Society to work for the Autism Accreditation Quality Assurance Programme. He has played a significant role in transitioning the programme from a deficit model of autism to one that is strengths-based, personal, centred, and empowering. Stephen has also overseen the development of a more streamlined and focussed process of assessment that seeks to celebrate quality of life outcomes. His work continues to be motivated by his passionate belief that autistic people are entitled to assess support informed by an understanding of evidence-based best practice.
