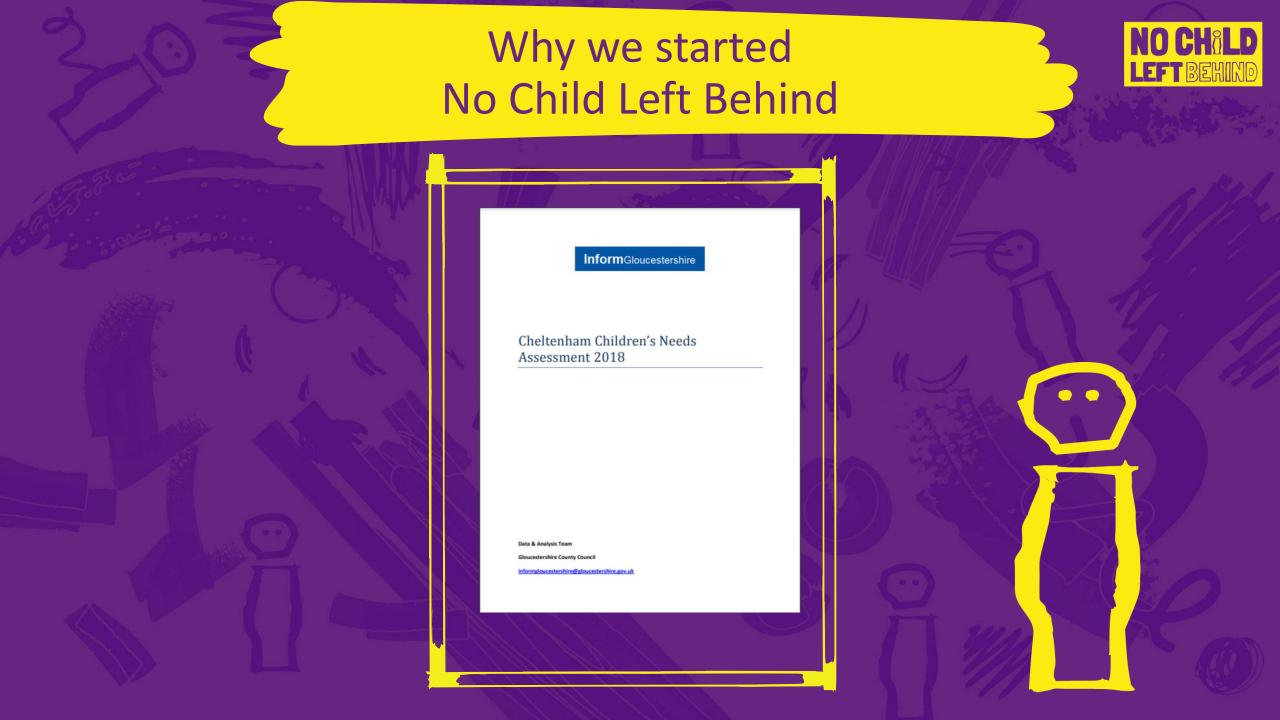

- Over 4000 children living in areas that are among the most deprived in the UK

- Recent research suggests there is a strong correlation between deprivation and child welfare interventions

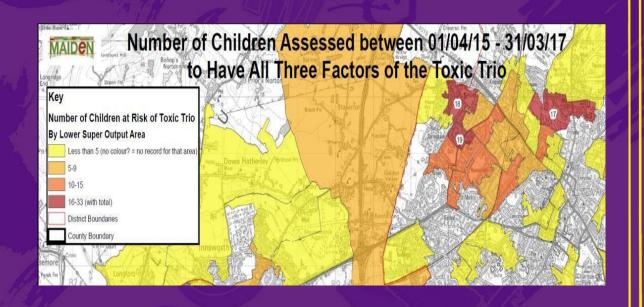

 Children living in homes where substance misuse, domestic abuse and parental mental health issues.

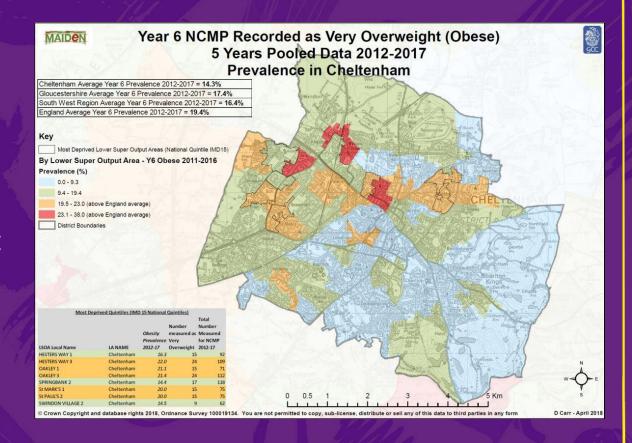






Physical and mental health

- Hospital admissions for self-harm most prevalent in both most deprived and least deprived.

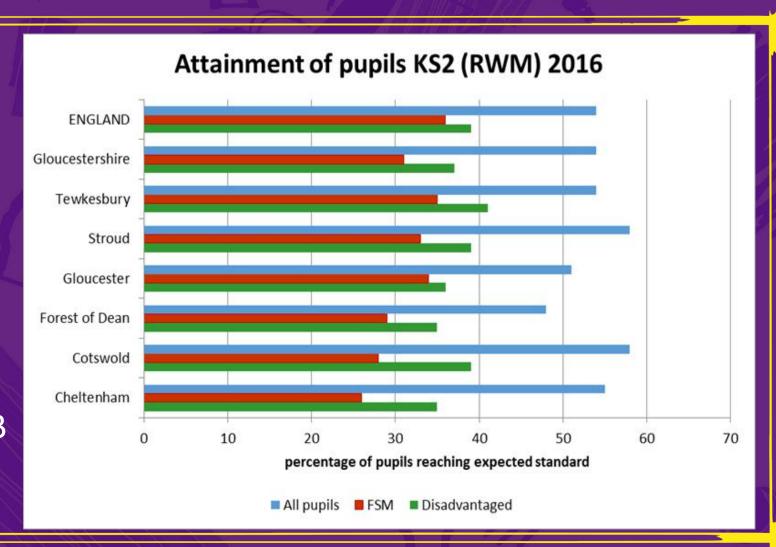




Educational Attainment
